### ITEM 2 INTRODUCTIONS & ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mr. De Haan, VCTC, gave an overview of the CTC proposed implementation schedule for programming funds for the Road Repair & Accountability Act of 2017 including funding for the SHOPP program, Local Streets and Roads Program, Trade Corridor Enhancement Account, and Solutions for Congested Corridors Program.

### ITEM 5 APPROVAL OF MINUTES

### **ACTION**

Mericle moved, seconded by Panah, that the Committee approve the minutes of the May 18, 2017 meeting. The motion passed unanimously.

### ITEM 6 CALTRANS LOCAL ASSISTANCE UPDATES

Mr. Wong reviewed new developments with regards to SB1 funding and the implementation of SHOPP projects and suggested that member agencies provide coordinated input through VCTC. He also reminded the Committee of the June 20<sup>th</sup> Quarterly Work Group at the Camarillo Library.

### ITEM 7 STATUS OF FEDERAL CMAQ AND STP PROJECTS

Mr. De Haan reviewed the status of the CMAQ and STP Project Lists.

### ITEM 8 STP LOAN TO SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY

Mr. DeHaan reviewed the request by the San Joaquin Council of Governments for a loan of \$6 million in Ventura County STP funds, with \$3 million to be repaid at the start of FFY 2017/18 and the remaining \$3 million to be repaid at the start of FFY 2018/19.

### Discussion

The Committee requested a report on the long range funding plan for the STP funds and an update on the status of the 101 Freeway Project.

### **ACTION**

Fleisch moved, seconded by Matsuoka, that the Committee approve \$6,000,000 loan of Ventura County Transportation Commission's oldest (Fiscal year 2015/16) regional

Surface Transportation Program apportionments to the San Joaquin Council of Governments (SJCOG), with \$3,000,000 to be repaid at the start of Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2017/18 and the remaining \$3,000,000 to be repaid at the start of FFY 2018/19. The motion carried unanimously.

## ITEM 9 ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION UPDATE: STATE ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PLAN ADOPTED; TWO (2) CTC ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM CALLS FOR PROJECTS

Ms. Johnduff, VCTC, reported that Caltrans recently adopted the State of California Active Transportation Plan and provided an overview of the two current Active Transportation Program Calls-for-Projects. There is a significant amount of additional ATP funding available due to the passage of SB1. The draft guidelines and schedules re posted on the CTC website.

The Committee discussed coordinating with Caltrans on the development of Complete Streets Corridor Plans now that the Wayfinding Study has been adopted and Caltrans will also be developing Complete Streets Corridor Plan. It was suggested that this item be added to the next Caltrans Quarterly Meeting Agenda.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL (RFP) UPDATE

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Receive US 101 PAED Request for Proposal Update.

### **DISCUSSION:**

On July 27, 2017 VCTC staff, working in partnership with Caltrans, issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the Project Approval and Environmental Document (PAED) Phase of the U.S. 101 HOV project. The project will provide in-depth analysis of lane configurations on US 101 largely based on the December 2013 Caltrans Project Study Report (PSR) and the environmental impacts of those improvements. The project limits are from Post Mile 3.11 (State Route 23) in the City of Thousand Oaks to Post Mile 30.10 (Chestnut Street) in the City of San Buenaventura. The project is anticipated to take three to four years and is estimated at \$9.5 million. Funding for this project is 100% federal through the Surface Transportation Program (STP).

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Receive presentation on the Regional Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) Architecture update

### **DISCUSSION:**

The Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is initiating a project to update the Southern California Regional Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) Architecture. The Regional ITS Architecture is a planning framework for ensuring that ITS projects and technologies for managing transportation systems are deployed in a coordinated fashion in the six-county region.

The Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (TTAC) participated in the development of the initial Regional ITS Architecture and the subsequent update. This project follows on those efforts. Mr. Phillip Law and Mr. Matt Gleason from SCAG along with Ms. Melissa Hewitt and Mr. Daniel Wong from Kimley-Horn will be presenting an overview of the project, project objectives, and ITS architectures in general.

SUBJECT: DISCUSSION OF AUGMENTATION TO CALTRANS SHOPP

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

• Consider recommendations to Caltrans regarding the SHOPP.

### **DISCUSSION:**

Due to the passage of SB 1 there is an estimated \$1.9 billion per year that will be added to the State Highway Operations and Protection Program (SHOPP) that provides funds for Caltrans rehabilitation, safety, and operations projects for the state highway system. At a June 8<sup>th</sup> CTC workshop it was stated that Caltrans is interested in local input on priorities for these funds. At its June meeting TTAC said that at a future meeting it would like to discuss possible SHOPP projects to suggest to Caltrans.

Interestingly, as demonstrated by the attached letter, there is interest in providing a more robust Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) role in nomination of projects for the SHOPP. There has also been a bill introduced in the Legislature (AB 515)that would require RTPA review of the draft SHOPP.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Interim State Highway Operation and Protection Program (SHOPP) Guidelines. These Interim Guidelines are on the June 28-29, 2017 CTC meeting agenda for adoption under Tab 24, and were developed to satisfy the provisions of Senate Bill 486 and Senate Bill 1.

The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is the regional transportation planning and funding agency for the nine-county San Francisco Bay Area. MTC is a close partner with

the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) in implementing important congestionrelief projects on the state highway system (SHS). In mature metropolitan areas such as the

Bay Area, incremental operational improvements provide the best benefit compared to cost for congestion relief. To that end, MTC committed regional discretionary funds to augment

Caltrans's commitment to operational improvements on the SHS, such as Transportation Management System elements that actively manage the transportation system. The Interim Guidelines recognize Caltrans's development of a Transportation Asset Management Plan (TAMP), as required by SB 486. MTC strongly supports the move to use an asset management approach to prioritize projects for SHOPP funding, the Bay Area has used similar strategies for pavement and transit assets. MTC further recommends that CTC require Caltrans to include device lifecycle operations and maintenance funding for any capital traffic operation device projects, either in the Interim SHOPP Guidelines or elsewhere in Caltrans's

budget. This will ensure that we have the resources to operate and maintain the equipment as it

Further, MTC seeks to have more robust involvement in the SHOPP project selection process, particularly in the area of operational improvements and Transportation Management Systems. The SHOPP development schedule and procedures should be expanded to include nomination of projects by regional agencies, and review and formal concurrence of candidate projects and priorities prior to local districts submitting a final list to Caltrans Headquarters. This coordinated effort can maximize the impact of limited transportation resources, in addition to expediting project delivery.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

### **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:**

The California Transportation Commission (CTC) has held several workshops over the past two months to solicit input from local governments, transportation stakeholders, and the public to develop guidelines to implement programs funded under the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. An update on the Active Transportation Program (ATP), Local Streets and Roads Program, the Solutions for Congested Corridors Program and Trade Corridors Program is provided below.

### **ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM (ATP) -- CYCLE 3 AUGMENTATION CALL-FOR-PROJECTS:**

- Five applications were submitted from Ventura County agencies for Augmentation Funding (FY17/18 and FY18/19). Ventura County's population share for this Call-for-Projects is approximately \$1.7 million. The CTC will post the staff recommendations for the Statewide Component on August 31<sup>th</sup>. SCAG will post MPO Component recommendations on September 29<sup>th</sup>.
- SCAG is again reserving 5% of the MPO share (\$2m) for Capacity Building, which includes planning and non- infrastructure projects. Applications are due August 31<sup>st</sup>. ### **LOCAL STREETS AND ROADS FUNDING:**

- The proposed final 2017 Local Streets and Roads Funding Annual Reporting Guidelines will be considered for CTC adoption at their August 16-17 meeting in Oakland.

- Local agency project lists are due to the CTC by October 16<sup>th</sup>, 2017.

### **SOLUTIONS FOR CONGESTED CORRIDORS PROGRAM:**

- \$250 Million per year—The 2018 Program Cycle will include the first 4 years (17/18 to 20/21) of funding totaling \$1 Billion with 3 year programming cycles to follow.
- Eligible Applicants VCTC, Caltrans
- Planning and Coordination at the Regional Level is expected to play a key role in this program.
- Projects will <u>only</u> be eligible if they are identified in an integrated Corridor Plan providing a multimodal approach to addressing Congested Corridors. Examples include:

SUBJECT: STATUS OF FEDERAL SURFACE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM (STP) AND CONGESTION MIGITATION

AND AIR QUALITY (CMAQ) PROJECTS

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Review and update project schedules.

### **DISCUSSION:**

Under federal law, STP and CMAQ funds apportioned to California lapse if they are not used within three years. AB 1012, which became law in October 1999, applies the three-year lapsing rule to CMAQ and STP funds in each county. It is important for VCTC to have an accurate schedule of STP and CMAQ (Attachments 1 and 2, respectively) projects to ensure that our region does not lose funds.

VCTC also uses this project schedule to ensure that the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) includes all of the projects which are ready-to-go and to manage the county's Obligational Authority (OA). The 2017 FTIP is now federally-approved and VCTC has also gotten approval of amendments for the projects as indicated on this list.

Attached are draft schedules of upcoming STP (Attachment A) and CMAQ (Attachment B) projects. Staff requests the Committee review the table and inform staff of any revisions that should be made. It is particularly important to have the correct status information and schedule for projects in the upcoming fiscal year (2017/18). If a project currently shown in later years is anticipated for delivery in 2017/18, then it is also important to provide the correct anticipated obligation date for that project.

As shown in the tables, there are anticipated to ample projects delivered to ensure that funds do not lapse in 2017/18. However, at this time there are not sufficient committed projects for the following years. However, the CMAQ call for projects currently underway should provide sufficient projects to prevent a CMAQ lapse for several years into the future.

Regarding STP, the Committee in June requested that VCTC provide further information on the anticipated expenditure of future funds. Due to SB 1, staff anticipates that future-year state funds will become available for construction of several large Ventura County projects. However, money is unlikely to become available quickly enough to move forward with pre-construction work for those projects in a timely manner. Staff will be come to the Committee in September with more detail on a strategy for use of SB 1 funds, but staff expects to propose use of STP to avoid project delay through preconstruction, and these expenditures should be sufficient to avoid a lapse of STP for many years to come.
