The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is the regional transportation planning and funding agency for the nine-county San Francisco Bay Area. MTC is a close partner with the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) in implementing important congestionrelief projects on the state highway system (SHS). In mature metropolitan areas such as the Bay Area, incremental operational improvements provide the best benefit compared to cost for congestion relief. To that end, MTC committed regional discretionary funds to augment Caltrans's commitment to operational improvements on the SHS, such as Transportation Management System elements that actively manage the transportation system.

The Interim Guidelines recognize Caltrans's development of a Transportation Asset Management Plan (TAMP), as required by SB 486. MTC strongly supports the move to use an asset management approach to prioritize projects for SHOPP funding, the Bay Area has used similar strategies for pavement and transit assets. MTC further recommends that CTC require Caltrans to include device lifecycle operations and maintenance funding for any capital traffic operation device projects, either in the Interim SHOPP Guidelines or elsewhere in Caltrans's budget. This will ensure that we have the resources to operate and maintain the equipment as it is deployed throughout the state.

Further, MTC seeks to have more robust involvement in the SHOPP project selection process, particularly in the area of operational improvements and Transportation Management Systems. The SHOPP development schedule and procedures should be expanded to include nomination of projects by regional agencies, and review and formal concurrence of candidate projects and priorities prior to local districts submitting a final list to Caltrans Headquarters. This coordinated effort can maximize the impact of limited transportation resources, in addition to expediting project delivery.
