**Recommendation**: Receive and file.

#### Discussion:

The Ventura Council of Governments (VCOG) and the Ventura County Transportation Council (VCTC) entered into a cooperative agreement on July 10, 2009 for the VCTC to administer the functions and activities of VCOG which included the financial reporting responsibilities.

Attached in a separate report is the Fiscal Year 2010/2011 audited financial statements presented in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP and are audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards by independent certified public accountants. The auditors, Vavrinek, Trine, Day and Company, LLP, issued an unqualified opinion on the Ventura Council of Government's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2011. The independent auditor's report is in included at the beginning of the attached audited financial statements. Also included as a separate attachment are the SAS 114 and GAS Opinion reports.

Management assumes full responsibility for the completeness and reliability of all of the information presented in this report, based upon the Commission's comprehensive framework of internal controls established for this purpose. Because the cost of internal control should not exceed anticipated benefits, the objective is to provide reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance that the financial statements are free of any material misstatements.

The Ventura Council of Governments ended Fiscal Year 2010/2011 with an unreserved ending fund balance of \$62,170.


 Receive and file the Call for Candidates for the Southern California Association of Governments' Regional Council District 46.

**Discussion**: Each year, district elections are conducted for the Southern California Association of Governments' (SCAG's) Regional Council. This year, the District 46 seat currently filled by Simi Valley City Council member Glen Becerra, encompassing the cities of Moorpark, Simi Valley and Thousand Oaks will be up for election.

All locally elected officials, defined by SCAG as mayors and city council members from SCAG member cities, within District 46 are eligible to be candidates for district representative. An electronic notice of this Call for Candidates will be sent to all local elected officials in the cities of Moorpark, Simi Valley and Thousand Oaks on January 6, 2012. Local elected officials wishing to be a candidate for District 46 must submit their names to VCOG's Executive Director, Mr. Darren Kettle either by email at: <a href="mailto:dkettle@goventura.org">dkettle@goventura.org</a> or by U.S. postal mail to: Ventura Council of Governments, ATTN: Mr. Darren Kettle, 950 County Square Drive Suite 207, Ventura, CA 93003 no later than January 20, 2012.

If more than one elected official submits their name to be a candidate for District 46 an election will be held on March 2, 2012 at 2:00 P.M. at Moorpark City Hall (Citrus Conference Room) 799 Moorpark Avenue, Moorpark, CA 93021. Elections must be held no later than 30 days prior to SCAG's General Assembly, this year to be held in April of 2012. If only one local elected official submits their name that individual shall be declared the District 46 Representative and no election will be held.

The VCOG Clerk of the Board shall send a second notice to all elected officials and city clerks in District 46 on February 17, 2012 providing the names of all candidates and the details of the election process should an election be required.



#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

 Receive and file a presentation on the 2012 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP)/Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) by SCAG's Executive Director, Mr. Hasan Ikhrata.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

As the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) representing the counties of Imperial, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and Ventura, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is required to develop a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) every four years. The RTP provides a vision that guides transportation investments over the next twenty years while answering the federal and state regulations mandating that transportation investments receiving federal funds meet clean air standards and strict environmental review. Brought about by the enactment of SB 375, the RTP must now include an integrated Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) that joins land use and transportation planning.

Over the past two years, SCAG has worked diligently with all of the cities in the region in an attempt to develop the RTP/SCS in a truly collaborative manner. SCAG sought policy and technical input from an incredibly wide variety of stakeholders both through formal committees and through public workshops held throughout the region including several in Ventura County. The Commission has been participating in the development of the RTP/SCS with SCAG and is appreciative of the effort SCAG has made to ensure Ventura County's perspectives and concerns have been included in the draft document.

On December 20, 2011 SCAG released the draft 2012 RTP for a fifty-five day public comment period that will conclude on February 14, 2012. SCAG will be holding two RTP workshops at the Camarillo Library on January 19, 2012, the first from 12:00 P.M. to 2:00 P.M. and the second from 5:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. The Commission's review of the Draft RTP is currently underway and anticipates bringing comments forward at its February meeting.

SCAG's Executive Director, Mr. Hasan Ikhrata, will present the Draft RTP to the Commission for its review.

#### **CALTRANS REPORT**

Mike Miles reported that bids were opened for the 101/HOV project. The bid by Granite Construction came in 31.13% lower than was estimated at \$52 million.

#### **COMMISSIONERS / EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT**

The Legislative Update in your agenda mentioned that the federal 2011/12 transportation appropriation had passed both houses of Congress and was in Conference Committee. Congress has now passed that legislation, and the President signed it two weeks ago. This action means that this year's federal transportation funding to Ventura County will remain at last year's level, which is good news considering that the original bill passed by the House contained a 34% cut.

House Republican leaders have announced they will soon act on a five-year transportation authorizing act to continue the existing level of transportation funding, adjusted for inflation. Since the trust fund revenues are not enough to maintain current spending, they are proposing to fund the shortfall using revenues from expanded domestic oil production. As mention in the staff report, the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee has passed a two-year authorization which will also continue the existing funding, plus inflation, however that bill does not identify funding. As you can imagine, the domestic drilling provision will likely be extremely controversial so it is unlikely there will be any agreement for some time regarding multi-year transportation program authorization.

At the October 7, 2011 Commission meeting the Commission approved a request for proposals (RFP) for a consultant to prepare an update to the 2007 Ventura County Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan. As a result of this RFP, VCTC received one proposal. The proposal, from AMMA Transit Planning, was fully responsive to the RFP, and AMMA is highly qualified to perform this work, having completed similar studies in other counties and having participated in preparation of the 2007 VCTC Plan. Staff is, therefore, contracting with AMMA to perform this work. Project scoping will take place during December 2011, and work will continue through the first several months of 2012. Public meetings will be held in both east and west county to receive input about transportation needs of the disabled, low income and elderly residents and (later) to review a draft report with the public. An ad hoc committee representing transit operators and social service providers will act as a steering committee, assisting VCTC staff with preparation of the Plan. We anticipate that the Plan will be presented for approval at the May 2012 Commission meeting.

Today is a significant day for your staff as it is Ed Webster's last day with VCTC before he retires. At this time I would like to publicly thank Ed for his eleven years of service to the Commission, first as the manager of VISTA and then a the manager for specialized transportation programs.

SUBJECT: MONTHLY BUDGET REPORT

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Receive and file the monthly budget report for November 2011

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The monthly budget report is presented in a comprehensive agency-wide format with the investment report presented at the end. The Annual Budget numbers are updated as the Commission approves budget amendments or administrative budget amendments are approved by the Executive Director.

The November 30, 2011 budget reports indicate that revenues were approximately 36.99% of the adopted budget while expenditures were approximately 27.35% of the adopted budget. Although the percentage of the budget year completed is shown, be advised that neither the revenues nor the expenditures occur on a percentage or monthly basis. For instance, some revenues are received at the beginning of the year while other revenues are received after grants are approved by federal agencies. In many instances, VCTC incurs expenses in advance of the revenues.

Because VCTC receives a large portion of their state and federal funding on a reimbursement basis, the Commission must keep sufficient funds liquid to meet changing cash flow requirements. For this reason, VCTC maintains checking accounts at Wells Fargo Bank.

The Commission's checking accounts for the General Fund are swept daily into a money market account. The interest earnings are deposited the following day. The first \$250,000 of the combined deposit balance is federally insured and the remaining balance is collateralized by Wells Fargo Bank.

The Commission's Local Transportation Funds (LTF), State Transit Assistance (STA) funds and SAFE funds are invested in the Ventura County investment pool. Interest is apportioned quarterly, in arrears, based on the average daily balance. The investment earnings are generally deposited into the accounts in two payments within the next quarter. Amounts shown are not adjusted for fair market valuations.

SUBJECT: RAIL OPERATIONS UPDATE

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Receive and file.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

#### **Metrolink Ridership:**

Based on passenger counts made by conductors on the Ventura Line, there were about 1,934 people who boarded the morning peak-hour trains to Los Angeles each weekday in December; about 50% of those boardings took place at Ventura County stations. This compares to about 1,996 boardings on the same trains in November.

Metrolink station counts are being collected on a quarterly basis, therefore, in January, information about station boardings from October to December will be reported. While ridership at the Ventura County stations have stayed about the same over the past year, the lack of significant ridership growth in this County is a concern and will continue to be evaluated. The new Metrolink marketing staff has several programs they will be implementing over the fiscal year to increase ridership; VCTC marketing consultants will be working closely with them on this effort.

#### **Metrolink On-Time Performance:**

The Ventura Line's on-time performance (trains arriving within five minutes of scheduled time) continued to be very good. Overall, during the month of December, 97% of the inbound trips and 95% of the outbound trips ran on-time.

#### Metrolink 2011 Holiday Train:

The Metrolink Holiday Toy Express operated two nights this December in Ventura County. This was the 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the special train, which was decorated with holiday lights and traveled with Santa Claus from station to station, collecting toys for giveaway during the holiday season. The toy collection drive was co-sponsored with local firefighters and the "Spark of Love" holiday toy campaign. The holiday train stopped on Saturday December 17<sup>th</sup> at Camarillo, Oxnard and Moorpark, and then on Sunday December 18<sup>th</sup> in Simi Valley. VCTC marketing staff was at the stations to coordinate with Metrolink and to incorporate VCTC marketing materials into the station events. Also at the stations this year wearing VCTC "Santa" hats, were members of VCTC's newly-formed Teen Council, who assisted with handing out treats to the crowds.

#### Metrolink FY 2012/13 Budget Development:

Metrolink staff is beginning the annual budget development for member agency review and consideration. The draft FY 2012/13 budget should be ready at the end of February in time for incorporation into VCTC's upcoming draft budget. At this time, no service changes are planned unless the estimated costs exceed the anticipated revenues. One new aspect of the budget development this year, was a meeting arranged by Metrolink's Finance Director with all the member agencies' Finance Directors, including Sally DeGeorge, representing VCTC. The meeting was held to make sure there is full communication with funding partners and that all financial concerns are aired and resolved before the budget is completed.

#### **Metrolink Bicycle Trains:**

In response to increased passenger demand for bringing bicycles on the trains, Metrolink has introduced passenger cars that have been reconfigured on the bottom level to hold eighteen bicycles instead of the usual two bicycle parking spots per train car. This is a pilot program to test the "bicycle cars" that was developed by Metrolink in cooperation with bicycle advocates and the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA). The special cars are marked with yellow bicycle decals on the car sides and were debuted on the Inland Empire Line weekend beach trains early in September. Because these trains have been so successful, sixteen more cars will be reconfigured to hold the additional bicycles over the next several months. The plan is to have at least one bicycle car on every train set in the system. For special event or weekend trains, additional bicycle cars might be added to the operation if need demands.

#### **LOSSAN Strategic Plan Update/Governance Discussion:**

In addition to participating in Metrolink commuter rail operations, VCTC is one of eight transportation agencies providing local input and administrative oversight to the State Division of Rail on LOSSAN intercity passenger rail operations. LOSSAN is the name of the Los Angeles-San Diego-San Luis Obispo Joint Powers Agency. The other agencies involved in LOSSAN are the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (METRO), the North San Diego Transit District (NCTD), the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA), the San Diego Association of Governments, (SANDAG), the San Diego Metropolitan Transit System (MTS), the Santa Barbara Association of Governments (SBCAG), and, the San Luis Obispo Council of Governments (SLOCOG).

The LOSSAN service area runs along the Coast Main Line from San Diego to San Luis Obispo providing the intercity passenger service operated by Amtrak Pacific Surfliner trains running in San Diego, Orange, Los Angeles, Ventura, Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo counties under a contract funded and administered by the State. There is also commuter rail service operating in the corridor: the Coaster operated by NCTD in San Diego County and Metrolink, operated by METRO, OCTA, RCTC, SANBAG and VCTC in those counties. The Coaster and Metrolink operations are federally and locally funded while the State supports the Surfliner trains.

VCTC is represented on the LOSSAN Board by Commissioners Millhouse and Humphrey. The ongoing planning and programming responsibilities for passenger rail in the LOSSAN corridor are split among the agencies involved in the intercity and commuter services, sometimes leading to passenger confusion about the services, and also, mixed results in obtaining State and Federal funds for capital and service improvements. Because of this situation, the LOSSAN Board of Directors has been taking a fresh look at the current and potential rail travel patterns, both intercity and commuter, and will be working towards better coordination of services in a variety of areas. A Strategic Plan evaluating LOSSAN service is currently being prepared and will be presented to the Commission for action likely in February. It is expected the report will result in significantly improved coordination between the administration and operation of the different rail services and an improved institutional structure to provide better oversight and control of costs.

At the LOSSAN Board meeting held in late August, it was voted unanimously to move forward with the recommendation to explore further taking over control of the LOSSAN intercity train operations from the State. A similar action was taken on the Capitol Corridor rail service operated in the Sacramento area in 1998. Clearly there are many details that need to be worked through as this is considered, including State funding guarantees, Board structure and voting, administrative arrangements, etc. It would also require State legislation to accomplish this goal, if it is finally approved for action. Staff is continuing to closely monitoring this initiative and will be presenting details for the possible rail reorganization to the Commission for review at the February meeting.

#### Santa Paula Branch Line (SPBL) Operations:

Staff is continuing to work with Fillmore and Western Railway (F&W) and Union Pacific Railroad (UP) which are the two operators on the SPPL, on generating additional revenues with the goal of making this vital asset self-sustaining in the near future. We are also working with Legal Counsel to update the existing VCTC/F&W agreement to reflect the current arrangements more accurately.

#### **Property Leases**

Staff has been working with F&W to review the existing SPBL leases to determine if additional revenues can be generated to offset the ongoing maintenance work. F&W staff are currently following up on letters sent to all leaseholders asking for their cooperation to review their lease agreement, and also, to make sure safe operations are in place for people working near the rail line. While it does not appear that significant additional revenues can be found at this time, there is some opportunity to approach leaseholders about adding property to their existing leases and bringing in more money; we will continue working on this effort.

#### Union Pacific (UP) Railroad

VCTC's agreement with UP requires the Commission maintain the tracks between Montalvo and Santa Paula without charge as long as UP runs freight on the Line. They currently have one customer, International Paper, with deliveries/pickups by rail three times a week. Staff is continuing discussions with UP and F&W to possibly establish a transloading arrangement, where the freight would be shifted from UP to F&W near Montalvo. In this type of arrangement, UP would pay F&W to transport freight to the existing UP customer i.e. International Paper, however, F&W could also provide other freight hauling opportunities to customers all along the SPBL corridor. It is possible additional freight customers could be added.

This hasn't been a priority in the past because UP got all the revenue while VCTC shouldered all the costs. However, there finally appears to be some movement on this issue from UP. They recently requested permission to perform a track survey in anticipation of formal discussions on this issue and this inspection took place October 22; this inspection took place without apparent problems or concerns being voiced by UP. Staff will continue to strongly advocate for this change.

SUBJECT: INSURANCE COVERAGE

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Receive and file.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Over the normal course of business, the Commission is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; and natural disasters. The Commission protects itself against such losses by a balanced program of risk retention, risk transfers and the purchase of commercial insurance. Capital projects and rail properties are protected through a combination of commercial insurance, insurance required by Commission consultants and a self-insurance fund established by the Southern California Regional Rail Authority (SCRRA). The Commission's worker's compensation insurance is covered through State Compensation Insurance Fund.

VCTC renewed its insurance coverage on November 20, 2011 (see Attachment A). VCTC's insurance package costs increased to \$123,583 which is approximately \$18,000 over budget. VCTC will offset the increased costs by reducing other indirect expenditures, specifically professional and human resource expenditures.

Ms. Joan Cavanagh of Schrimmer-Cavanagh insurance indicated that the reason for the premium increase to VCTC's insurance coverage was twofold. First, there has been an increase in the number of claims in general to insurance agencies and the carriers are raising rates based on industry losses. The average rate increases seen have ranged from five to fifteen percent. Second, VCTC's insurance costs increased in part because of two on-going claims (Beserra and Tillery described as noted on page 13 of Attachment A).

SUBJECT: COUNTYWIDE TRANSIT STUDY CONSULTANT CONTRACT AMENDMENT

#### RECOMMENDATION

- Amend MIG contract for Countywide Transit planning activities, increasing the contract by \$60,000
- Amend the VCTC Regional Transit Planning budget, including expenditures and revenues in the amount of \$60,000 in State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF).

## **BACKGROUND**

The Commission has been working for the past year on the Regional Transit Study, which focused on developing a response to California Public Utilities Code Section 99232.3, which states:

The Ventura County Transportation Commission may submit to the Senate Committee on Transportation and Housing and the Assembly Committee on Transportation a report analyzing options for organizing public mass transportation services in the county, for the expenditure of revenues deposited in the local transportation fund, and a recommended legislative proposal for implementing the plan by December 31, 2011.

VCTC executed a contract for \$260,000 with MIG to develop the report called for by the State Legislature. While significant progress has been made, in response to a request to the Regional Transit Study Steering Committee from a number of City Managers of cities which operate community transit systems, a recommendation was made to extend the study. Specifically, the Steering Committee requested that the transit operators meet and develop a service delivery organizational proposal based on the cooperation and coordination alternatives. The Committee also directed VCTC staff and the consultant team to meet with and facilitate the work of the transit operators in this effort. The Steering Committee recognized that this would extend the timeframe for reporting to the Legislature past the date called for in SB 716 but, if this option could be presented to the Steering Committee prior to the February 3, 2012 Commission meeting, the Commission would be able to provide timely input to the current legislative session. To meet this schedule, the Steering Committee will need to meet in January and the operator input should be received prior to that meeting.

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This recommendation was integrated into the VCTC Regional Transit Study workplan as part of the report at the Commission meeting on December 2, 2011, the date on which the consultant was scheduled to complete the project. For the consultant team to provide support to the Commission and Steering Committee, fully analyze the proposal from the transit operators, and working with the Steering Committee, prepare a final report for action by the full Commission and submission in February to the State Legislature, additional funding is needed. Staff estimates that an additional \$60,000 will be required, and is recommending that those funds be transferred from the VCTC State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF) reserves. The California Public Utilities code identifies STAF as an eligible use for transit planning activities.

**LAPSING FUNDS - PUBLIC HEARING** 

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

 Approve the attached Program of Projects (POP) to allocate for Mobility Management (Travel Training) by Mobility Management Partners Inc. \$26,792 in potentially lapsing Section 5316 Jobs Access / Reverse Commute (JARC) in the Oxnard/Ventura Urban Area.

## **BACKGROUND:**

Federal law requires that at a minimum of every two years VCTC conduct a competitive call for projects to receive funds from the Section 5316 JARC and Section 5317 New Freedom programs. VCTC conducted its most recent competitive call during Fiscal Year 2010/11. However, with all funds approved under that call now having been obligated, there remains a balance of \$26,792 in Oxnard/Ventura JARC funds scheduled to expire on September 30, 2012. Staff therefore recommends that at this time VCTC initiate the process to obligate these funds to ensure that they do not lapse.

This item was discussed by TRANSCOM, which proposed that the lapsing funds be programmed based on where funds have been requested, but not provided, and where funds may be most needed to ensure cash flow over the next two years. Based on these criteria, TRANSCOM recommended that the \$26,792 in potentially lapsing Oxnard/Ventura JARC funds be provided to Mobility Management Partners for its Mobility Management Program, including Travel Training. VCTC staff supports this recommendation.

The attached public hearing notice and POP list was published in the Ventura County <u>Star</u> on December 19, 2011.

## **Program of Projects**

The Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) will hold a public hearing on the Program of Projects (POP) for the Oxnard and Thousand Oaks Urbanized Areas (UAs) for a project to be funded with Federal Transit Administration Jobs Access Reverse Commute (JARC) funds. The JARC funds available in Fiscal Year 2011/12 are estimated to be \$688,000 in the Oxnard UA based on anticipated FY 2012 funds and prior year carry-over funds. The public hearing will be held at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, January 6, 2012, in the Camarillo City Council Chamber, 601 Carmen Drive, in Camarillo. The POP is available for public inspection at 950 County Square Drive, Suite 207, Ventura CA 93003. Unless a subsequent notice is published, this project list will become the final Program of Projects for inclusion in the Southern California Association of Governments Regional Transportation Improvement Program.

SUBJECT: 2012 LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Adopt 2012 Legislative Program (Attachment).

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Every year the Commission adopts a Legislative Program for the upcoming year, for both State and Federal legislation. The Legislative Program sets forth in general terms the Commission's overall priorities, to provide legislators, their staffs, and the public with a sense of what the Commission feels are the important transportation issues requiring attention. The adopted Legislative Program also gives staff its basic direction for legislative involvement, so that it can often react quickly as developments occur. As the year progresses, staff will return to the Commission to request positions on specific legislative proposals including bills that are introduced.

#### **DISCUSSION**

#### Federal Issues

There continues to be no new authorization of the Federal transportation program. The prior authorization was originally scheduled to expire September 30, 2009, and there have been several short-term extensions. Although a two-year authorization has been moving in the Senate, and House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee Chair John Mica has expressed his determination to pass a new six-year bill prior to the current extension's expiration in March, 2012, the chances of a multi-year authorization passing before the 2012 election appear dim. However, VCTC continues to support a new bill and work with our regional partners to consider issues relating to authorization.

The regional agencies have continued staff-level discussions regarding elements to advocate for inclusion in a new authorization, including the Breaking Down Barriers Initiative started by the Orange County Transportation Authority. There are also other issues of particular concern to VCTC and the region, including the need for continued federal support for rail safety, and continuation of funds where most needed to address air quality, as with the current Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) program. Although there has been significant discussion of eliminating funding earmarks, the 2011 Program continues to identify the Route 101/23 Interchange Improvement Project as the top highway earmark priority, and the Gold Coast Transit Maintenance Facility as the top transit earmark priority, should earmarks be included in the new authorization law.

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## **State Issues**

This past year the ratification of the gas tax "swap" to meet the requirements of Proposition 26, has apparently reduced uncertainty with State transportation financing. However, with the continued State General Fund shortfall, VCTC will need to continue monitoring state funding developments and oppose any further efforts that may arise to take transportation funds to help the General Fund.

The proposed legislative program continues a number of items from prior years. These items include support for LOSSAN corridor study recommendations, extending the SB 375 environmental streamlining provisions to transportation projects meeting SB 375 requirements, and increased flexibility for installation of bike racks on buses. It is anticipated that a significant emphasis of this year's legislative efforts will be the implementation of VCTC's response to the Legislature as called for under SB 716. Although VCTC has not yet finalized the Regional Transit Study, it is anticipated that within the next few months VCTC will complete the report and then submit its recommendation to the Legislature, at which time the Commission should work with the Legislature to support the recommended actions.

## VENTURA COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION 2012 LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

#### STATE LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

#### A. TRANSPORTATION FUNDING

- Support efforts to maintain and protect transportation funding as approved under the gas tax swap legislation.
- Oppose shifting transportation resources to other uses such as General Fund relief.
- Support the continued ability of regions to set priorities as set forth in SB 45, and oppose any
  efforts to lessen regional agencies' jurisdiction over the regional program within the State
  Transportation Improvement Program.
- Support continuation of the Safe Routes to Schools program.
- Support increased funding for bike and pedestrian facilities and bus transit.

#### B. RAIL PROGRAM

- Support legislation as needed based on the upcoming planning for LOSSAN Corridor reorganization/consolidation, while ensuring the state continues its commitment to fund intercity rail service ongoing operations and expansion.
- Support incentives to encourage the citing of transit oriented development projects.

#### C. PLANNING

- Participate with other Southern California regional agencies to incorporate regional needs as appropriate in clean-up legislation for SB 375, the law requiring regional transportation and land use planning to address global climate change. In particular, support extension of SB 375 California Environmental Quality Act streamlining provisions to transportation.
- Advocate for implementation of VCTC's recommendations, to be submitted shortly to the Legislature as called for by SB 716.
- Support Transportation Demand Management measures to reduce auto trips, including facilitation of technology, such as telecommuting, videoconferencing, and smart utility meters.
- Monitor legislation to broaden eligibility for use of High-Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) lanes or High-Occupancy Toll (HOT) lanes beyond multiple-occupant vehicles, and vehicles paying tolls in the case of HOT lanes.
- Work in coordination with other transit operators to obtain greater vehicle code flexibility to allow installation of bus bicycle racks holding up to three bicycles.

## FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

- Participate in discussions regarding SAFETEA-LU reauthorization, working with other Southern California transportation agencies to advocate for regional priorities including the Breaking Down Barriers Initiative.
- Support authorization earmarks for Route 101/23 interchange improvements and a new Gold Coast Transit operations facility.
- Support maintaining the existing transportation appropriation level in the Fiscal Year 2013 federal budget, while monitoring and supporting as appropriate possible solutions to the impending insolvency of federal transportation accounts.
- Work with the Southern California Regional Rail Authority and other member agencies to advocate for further Federal action in support of rail safety, including any federal actions needed to support timely Positive Train Control implementation.
- Support continuation of federal programs and funding, such as Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), which provide special benefits to Ventura County. In particular, support continuation of the eligibility of transit operating demonstration projects for CMAQ funds.
- Support continuation of the delegation to Caltrans of responsibility under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).
